Host Site: Alaska Legal Services Corporation

Topic of Project: Rural General Practice

Location: Bethel, AK

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow at Alaska Legal Services Corporation (ALSC) will provide general legal services to rural communities in Bethel, Alaska. The Fellow will assist the Bethel office staff by interviewing clients, developing cases, and performing research and writing. Under attorney supervision, the Fellow will maintain their own caseload, ranging from providing brief services to representing clients in administrative hearings. Beyond direct client services, the Fellow will assist ALSC staff in efforts to empower communities by increasing knowledge of the legal system and local resources. The Fellow will also assist ALSC staff with the Pro Bono Training Academy, which is an online resource that trains non-attorney community advocates to assist clients, and BeneFactor, an app that guides caseworkers through the steps needed to assemble a successful disability application.

Applicant Qualifications:

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow. However, ALSC has successfully supported remote fellows during the past two years, and we are happy to consider a remote or telework fellow in 2022. The Fellow's workload is well-suited to remote work.

Housing in Bethel can be difficult to find and expensive. While we cannot provide financial assistance with housing, we can help the Fellow locate available housing in Bethel.





Host Site: Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky (AppalReD)

Topic of Project: Benefits and General Legal Assistance

Location: Prestonburg, KY

Description of Fellow Project:

Over six years since it began, AppalReD Legal Aid continues to confront the humanitarian crisis involving the former clients of private attorney Eric C. Conn who are facing reviews and the possible loss of their Social Security Disability and/or SSI benefits. Since May 2015, AppalReD Legal Aid attorneys and volunteer attorneys from around the country have worked tirelessly to try to protect the benefits of those affected. This Fellowship will primarily involve directly assisting those impacted by the crisis.

The Fellow will assist AppalReD Legal Aid attorneys in handling these cases at the administrative court (ALJ) and appeal levels. The work will involve interviewing clients, reviewing and summarizing medical records, performing legal research, drafting memoranda, assisting with briefs, and completing other tasks. If feasible, the Fellow will represent one or more of the claimants at ALJ hearings under the supervision of an AppalReD Legal Aid attorney.

The Fellow will also assist AppalReD Legal Aid's Prestonsburg office and AppalReD Legal Aid's advocacy director with general practice including client interviewing and intake, legal research, drafting, outreach, and other tasks.

Applicant Qualifications:

The project will be in-person if public health conditions allow.





Host Site: California Rural Legal Assistance, Inc.

Topic of Project: LGBTQ+

Location: Any CRLA field office

This project is conducted statewide and most work will be done remotely.

Description of Fellow Project:

As part of CRLA's LGBTQ+ Program, the Fellow will address legal issues affecting rural transgender and gender-non-conforming Californians. The Fellow will work with the LGBTQ+ Program's advocates to investigate potential harassment and discrimination claims and provide direct legal services in the areas of identity-document updates, immigration, employment, housing, healthcare access, and education. The Fellow will also work with LGBTQ+ Program staff to streamline and expand CRLA's statewide name and gender marker correction practice that includes: 1) developing and conducting workshops or clinics for transgender and gender-non-conforming community members who wish to obtain a court decree to update their name and gender markers on identity documents; 2) developing educational materials for community members and service providers; and 3) supporting CRLA's attorneys in the provision of individual legal representation.

Additional Applicant Qualifications:

- Applicants must be bilingual (spoken and written) in English and Spanish
- Access to reliable transportation is preferred
- Passion and commitment to empowering LGBTQ+ communities
- Commitment to racial justice
- Commitment to trauma-informed, intersectional, and community-centered lawyering
- Interest in the areas of name and gender marker corrections, immigration, employment, housing, public benefits, access to healthcare, and criminal record expungement
- Experience working with immigrant communities, LGBTQ+ communities, low-income clients, or survivors of violence





Host Site: Center for Arkansas Legal Services

Topic of Project: Housing

Location: Pine Bluff, AR

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

This Fellowship will place a law student with “Keeping it in the Family,” a special initiative to reduce generational poverty through home ownership and estate planning. Working under the supervision of a licensed attorney, the Fellow will be assigned to work in the poorest communities of the Arkansas Delta. Too many Arkansans lose their inherited homes for lack of proper title. These Arkansans live on family land or “heir property” that has been passed down informally from generation-to-generation. This is especially true for African-American families. According to the Agricultural Census, African-American farmers have lost approximately 90% of their land since 1910. The successful Fellow will protect family land through “Wills on Wheels” clinics to prevent title issues before they occur, participate in community outreach, and provide litigation support to CALS staff attorneys.

Applicant Qualifications:

- Access to a reliable vehicle
- Spanish speaking is preferred, but not required





Host Site: Colorado Legal Services

Topic of Project: Farmworkers Rights

Location of Fellow: Grand Junction, CO

This Fellowship will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will represent the Colorado Legal Services (CLS) Migrant Farm Worker Division in the Western Slope region of Colorado and will focus on the legal needs of farmworkers living and working in that region, including working conditions, wage issues, civil rights, sexual harassment, human trafficking and immigration. The Fellow will collaborate with key partners and conduct outreach to farmworkers at labor camps and other farm housing sites and provide information about the new state law that resulted in significant protections for Colorado farmworkers. The Fellow will also work on individual cases such as fact gathering, performing legal research and analysis of legal issues that arise, drafting declarations, responding to requests for evidence from administrative agencies and drafting discovery requests.

Applicant Qualifications:

- The Fellow will need to reside in the area they will be serving during the summer. CLS does not have housing available for Fellows but will be able to provide leads and contacts for the Fellows to secure suitable housing in the area they will be working. A laptop computer, a headset and phone line, along with additional resources and materials will be provided to the Fellow to enable them to work remotely when needed. The Fellow will have the means necessary to be able to communicate with their supervisor via email, instant message (Teams), telephone, zoom meetings and in person.
- Bilingual in English and Spanish.
- Access to reliable transportation. The Fellow will be reimbursed for any work-related mileage expenses per CLS policy.





Host Site: DNA Peoples Legal Services, Inc

Topic of Project: Tribal Law

Location: Window Rock, AZ

Project location may be in any Navajo Nation office, and the host site will work with Fellows to determine which office would be most appropriate. To ensure safety during the coronavirus pandemic, which has disproportionately impacted the Navajo Nation, the host site will consider and may require Fellows to work remotely.

Description of Fellow Project:

DNA Peoples Legal Services, Inc. (DNA)'s Navajo & Tribal Law - Student Summer Immersion program offers the opportunity for students to work alongside and under the supervision of Navajo licensed attorneys to provide outreach, community legal education, and a full spectrum of legal assistance. Legal assistance provided is determined by, and focused on, the legal needs presented by residents in the Navajo communities. By providing services, and living in the community, Fellows learn first-hand about legal issues that commonly impact our Navajo clients, legal remedies we pursue to address these issues, and some unique challenges to serving our tribal communities. DNA intentionally offers a broad-focus Fellowship to provide the student with an experience that realistically represents the work we do, and what it is like to work as an attorney at DNA.

The Fellowship requires the student to participate fully in regular office activities, including intake, applicant interviews, case acceptance meetings, data collection and timekeeping, legal research, community outreach, document preparation, and court appearances. With this breadth of integration, Fellows gain knowledge of Navajo law plus a very realistic understanding of the daily professional life of a DNA attorney.

Applicant Qualifications:

DNA can provide housing assistance for potential Fellows.





Host Site: East River Legal Services

Topic of Project: Rural and General Civil Legal Aid

Location: Sioux Falls, SD

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will assist low-income South Dakotans throughout rural South Dakota through improving current pro se form instructions and creating additional easy to read guide materials. The Fellow(s) will assist in developing, editing, and curating informational materials on the South Dakota statewide help page, www.sdlawhelp.org. The Fellow(s) will also assist clients through outreach, educational events, and clinics aimed at improving access to justice for low-income and otherwise marginalized members of the community.

Applicant Qualifications:

- Travel will be required for outreach and educational events. If necessary, the Fellow can travel with program staff.





Host Site: Georgia Legal Services Program

Topic of Project: Disaster Preparedness

Location of Fellow: Atlanta, GA

The Fellowship will be both remote & in-person. Some in-person attendance at various meetings and community education will be required.

Description of Fellow Project:

This Fellowship project will focus on assisting rural Georgians in communities of color prepare for a disaster, with a concentration on securing homeownership and preserving wealth in those communities hit hardest by natural disasters. This fellowship arises out of the efforts of “Georgia Team Ready”—a disaster relief project based out of the host site’s Pro Bono Program in partnership with the State Bar of Georgia, Troutman Pepper, Alston & Bird, and Kilpatrick Townsend & Stockton.

After a natural disaster, many low-income individuals face systemic barriers in the Federal Emergency Management Agency (“FEMA”) recovery process that have long-lasting and devastating effects on their communities. This is particularly true in historically Black, rural neighborhoods in Georgia. During Hurricane Michael in 2018, southwest Georgia sustained significant storm damage. According to FEMA, the three (3) zip codes with the most applications for housing assistance after Hurricane Michael were located in Albany, Bainbridge, and Donalsonville, Georgia.

The Fellow would take the lead in conducting a needs assessment to find targeted low-income, rural areas most often impacted by natural disasters. Following this needs assessment, the fellow would draft educational materials for those high-risk communities and training materials for volunteer lawyers to assist in the FEMA recovery process following a federally mandated disaster.

Applicant Qualifications:

- Language proficiency in Spanish and English
- Access to reliable transportation





Host Site: Land of Lincoln Legal Aid, Inc.

Topic of Project: Domestic Violence

Location: Charleston, IL

The project will be in-person as long as public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will work alongside and under the supervision of our experienced Eastern Regional Offices attorneys and staff to perform outreach, community education and provide legal assistance to a growing population of domestic violence survivors who face isolation and economic instability due to the remoteness of rural Illinois which lacks public transportation, childcare, and sometimes even cellphone service. The greatest number of residents seeking our help from the Charleston office are survivors of domestic or sexual violence. The Fellow will be trained on how to assist and represent these at-risk clients in a holistic way, particularly as our clients often have more than one legal issue at a time.

In addition, the Fellow will work directly with the supervising attorney to secure clients' immediate safety from their abusers, typically by seeking emergency and plenary orders of protection. Once we have secured the immediate physical safety of the client and their family, Land of Lincoln and the Fellow will work with the client to identify other legal matters that our organization can assist with to ensure long-term independence from their abuser. The Fellow will administer a civil legal needs assessment to each client and help other attorneys who may file matters on the survivor's behalf—such as a divorce or bankruptcy—or defend in eviction or getting public benefits reinstated. The Fellow will also conduct safety planning and future legal risk management counseling with the client, as well as draft pleadings and letters, obtain evidence, and attend court and negotiations. The student will gain the knowledge and direct hands-on experience of providing holistic civil legal help to individuals in crisis in rural, central Illinois.

Host Site: Legal Aid of Arkansas, Inc.

Topic of Project: Opioid Epidemic

Location: Newport, AR

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow. Legal Aid of Arkansas staff are experienced at working and supervising remotely, thus if a fellow were to work remotely, they would be provided the necessary technology and software to continue their work successfully.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will join the statewide justice, “Beyond Opioids - Breaking Legal Barriers for Families in Recovery,” the first collaborative project among legal aid programs within a state focused on people impacted by the opioid crisis and other substance use disorders. In Arkansas, two legal aid programs are the Center for Arkansas Legal Services (CALs) and Legal Aid of Arkansas (Legal Aid), serving a total of 75 counties. This Fellow serves in Legal Aid’s service area.

This Fellowship is an advocacy project focused on providing free civil legal aid to low-income Arkansans with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) with barriers to treatment. The Fellow, under the tutelage of the Beyond Opioids workgroup leader, will provide direct legal services to the target population and conduct outreach and education in partnership with methadone providers in the underserved Delta Region. This Fellowship will work towards the short-term goal of rooting out prejudicial practices in clinical and judicial settings to pave a path for civil legal advocacy to reduce treatment barriers for individuals with OUD.

Host Site: Legal Aid of Nebraska

Topic of Project: Tribal Law; Housing

Location: Omaha, NE

The project will be in-person if public health conditions allow, however some remote work is possible.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will work with Legal Aid of Nebraska's Native American Program to develop litigation strategies, a community education program, and provide direct legal services to Native Americans residing in communities on or near reservations or in tribal service areas, who have legal issues related to housing. These areas are not only rural, but have a significantly higher poverty population than the general population. The Nebraska Tribes have identified safe and affordable housing as a need in their communities. There is a dearth of rental housing in these areas, and much of what is available is substandard and owned by non-Native landlords who exercise predatory business practices.

In order to help address housing related issues faced by Native Americans residing in rural areas, the Fellow will:

- 1) Assist the Native American Program to develop and implement a community education program regarding housing rights including developing materials and conducting outreach and education to partners and Native American community members;
- 2) Assist Native American Program attorneys with housing and related cases, including conducting client interviews, drafting pleadings, conducting legal research and attending court hearings;
- 3) Develop standard pleadings, questionnaires and other materials to incorporate in litigating housing related issues;
- 4) Research impact litigation and advocacy strategies that can be used to achieve and meaningful outcomes; and
- 5) Assist Native American Program attorneys with other cases.

Applicant Qualifications:

- Ability to travel through Northeast Nebraska and surrounding areas.
- Interest or experience working with Native American communities preferred.
- Interest or experience working with housing related legal issues preferred.





Host Site: Legal Aid of NorthWest Texas

Topic of Project: Housing; Consumer Finance

Location: Wichita Falls, TX

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow. Remote work will be possible for some tasks as necessary. If health and safety standards do not permit in-person work, then all work will be remote.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow serving at Legal Aid of NorthWest Texas (LANWT) will focus on providing direct legal services and outreach/community education to the underserved populations in the rural counties served by the Wichita Falls Office. The Fellow will focus on three priority areas below relating to economic stability, with the overall objective of providing housing stability.

Housing: Due to the Pandemic, the eviction crisis and related rental assistance resources are a high priority demanding both outreach/education in live and virtual clinics, and direct legal assistance in eviction defense/rental assistance cases. The Fellow will also provide assistance with the unusual number of rent to own/contract for deed issues in Wichita County and surrounding counties to keep people in their homes.

Consumer Finance: The Fellow will help address issues in the area of Consumer Law and specifically debt collection cases. Legal assistance in these cases has a direct impact on economic stability.

Barrier Removal: The Fellow will also address removal of barriers. This includes direct legal assistance in obtaining expunctions and driver's license restoration. The Fellow will participate in barrier removal clinics and assist with direct legal services to remove barriers to employment, education and housing.

Applicant Qualifications:

- Language proficiency in both Spanish and English is preferred.
- Access to reliable transportation.





Host Site: Legal Aid of West Virginia, Inc.

Topic of Project: Housing

Location: Beckley, WV & Elkins, WV

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Legal Help for Renters Fellow at Legal Aid of West Virginia will work closely with experienced LAWV attorneys on two types of work. In counties served by Legal Aid's Beckley and Elkins offices, the Fellows will:

- 1) Provide direct civil legal services focusing on stabilizing clients' housing and economic stability to rural renters facing or at risk of eviction. Fellows will work closely with LAWV staff on eviction prevention work. They will also participate in holistic assessments of client legal needs to determine if legal help on such issues as drivers' license reinstatement, child support, public benefits, a domestic violence protective order, or an expungement would improve the client's long-term prospects for maintaining shelter and stability. In working with LAWV staff attorneys to assist rural renters, Fellows' tasks will include conducting client interviews, doing research, drafting legal memoranda and pleadings, carrying out case discovery and attending administrative proceedings and hearings.
- 2) Assist LAWV staff in targeted outreach and legal education for community partners and the public on legal issues related to the above topics. Fellows will work with their assigned local offices to design and implement a "Rural Renters Outreach Campaign" to increase client awareness of how to take advantage of Emergency Rental Assistance funds available through the West Virginia Housing Development Fund, and of legal help available through LAWV for eligible clients. Fellows will also develop community education materials on eviction prevention and legal interventions which stabilize housing and income.

Applicant Qualifications:

We can provide housing assistance to the students in the form of helping them identify local options and networking within local communities to ascertain what housing opportunities are available.





Host Site: Legal Aid Services of Oregon

Topic of Project: Housing

Location of Fellow: Albany, OR

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow. Some work can be done remotely but not all, and court appearances at the justice court and outreach can only be done in-person.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will work in Linn and Benton County, which have been hard hit by the lifting of the eviction moratorium. The Fellow will conduct outreach to low-income housing communities, mobile home parks and resource centers where low-income individuals usually turn to when attempting to access rental housing assistance and other safety net programs. The Fellow will also educate tenants about their rights, work with staff attorneys to provide legal representation in eviction cases, collect data about eviction proceedings; and examine compliance of the courts with various rules and statutes meant to protect tenants now that the moratorium on evictions has been lifted, with the overarching goal to preserve a tenant's housing by avoiding eviction.

Applicant Qualifications:

Housing is at a premium in Albany. If the Fellow requires housing, they are advised to seek housing as soon as the position is secured. Short-term housing is generally more available in Corvallis, a college town about 20 minutes from the office. We are willing to consider a flexible schedule to the maximum extent possible in order to minimize commuting for the Fellow.





Host Site: Legal Aid Society of Greater Cincinnati

Topic of Project: Kinship Care

Location: Cincinnati, OH

The project will be in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Rural Summer Legal Corps Fellow will support Legal Aid's Kinship Care Team, which provides assistance to grandparents and others who are caring for children whose parents cannot raise them due to a variety of issues, including substance use, untreated mental illness, or incarceration. The goal of the Kinship Care Team is to bring stability and economic security, through comprehensive legal assistance, to kinship caregiver families. Major components of the project include outreach, maintenance of referral relationships with partner agencies, brief-service legal clinics in our seven counties, with a particular emphasis on our four most rural counties (Brown, Clermont, Clinton and Highland), and legal advocacy to help clients access public benefits like Medicaid, Food Stamps, and cash payments to support the children they are raising.

The RSLC Fellow will have extensive client contact, and will be a critical part of our ability to serve a high volume of kinship families. The Fellow will conduct telephone intake interviews to determine client eligibility and obtain background information in preparation for review by an attorney. The Fellow will help determine if a kinship caregiver just wants information, without further representation, or would like to meet with an attorney to discuss their case in more detail. The Fellow will collaborate with the Ohio Justice Bus (a project of the Ohio Access to Justice Foundation) to schedule and publicize in-person clinics, outreach, and education events in our rural communities. The Fellow, with training and supervision, will practice issue-spotting and synthesize potential legal issues for the attorneys. When appropriate, the Fellow will draft custody pleadings for clinic clients, to be reviewed and approved by an attorney supervisor.

Finally, the Fellow will work as a law clerk for all of the attorneys on the Kinship Care Team. As a law clerk, the Fellow may perform research any issue affecting a kinship family, including housing, education, public benefits, and custody. In addition to legal research, the fellow will, draft motions and assist with investigation and trial preparation.

Applicant Qualifications:

Access to reliable transportation is preferred but not required





Host Site: Legal Aid Society of Middle Tennessee and the Cumberland

Topic of Project: Outreach; Expungement

Location: Columbia, TN

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow serving in the Legal Aid Society of Middle Tennessee and the Cumberland (LAS) Rural Reentry Outreach & Legal Clinics Project will support legal work to assist low-income, rural individuals facing societal barriers due to prior criminal records in rural counties served by LAS.

Reentry legal services include criminal record expungement; driver's license reinstatement; certificates of employability for private employers and state licensing; and any other legal services that may assist in a more seamless reentry post-incarceration. LAS re-entry services bridge the gap in services to the formerly incarcerated and provide social equity to persons of color.

Host Site: Legal Aid Society of Mid-New York, Inc.

Topic of Project: Farmworkers Rights

Location of Fellow: New Paltz, NY

Description of Fellow Project:

An RSLC Fellow will gain experience with all of the types of cases that come to Farmworker Law Project (“FLP”) from agricultural workers across New York, including trafficking, wage theft, workplace health and safety, discrimination, and civil rights. The Fellow’s work will have a special emphasis on housing issues unique to New York farmworkers. In New York, thousands of workers live in uninspected, substandard, employer-provided housing located at year-round labor camps. Some of the issues that have come up within the past year alone are brown drinking water, mold, sewage back-up, cracked windows, exposed wiring, overcrowded conditions that have led to COVID outbreaks, a lack of heat during cold months, and illegal self-help evictions.

An RSLC Fellow will be exposed to FLP’s work at all stages of a case, including intake, client interviews, and investigations. The Fellow will conduct research and draft legal memoranda, draft administrative and court complaints, and identify cases/clients for impact litigation, and have the opportunity to conduct outreach at labor camps around New York State, helping deliver outreach presentations in both English and Spanish. The Fellow would be expected to draft legal education materials focusing on housing conditions and housing rights, and would then be in charge of organizing presentations and developing an outreach strategy focused on housing. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the vulnerability of farmworkers living in overcrowded worker housing, this would involve farmworker rights related to COVID-19 as well. At the end of the summer, the Fellow will have gained experience in all aspects of the work of a rural farmworker legal services attorney.

Applicant Qualifications:

- Although all work-related outreach will occur with a rental car driven by FLP staff from the office, the Fellow must have the ability to get to the office via public transportation or personal vehicle when FLP staff plan to travel to labor camps.
- Proficiency in Spanish and English
- Fellows must be available to conduct in-person outreach around New York State, including overnight (all work-related travel expenses covered)





Host Site: Legal Aid Society of Northeastern New York, Inc.

Topic of Project: Family Law

Location: Amsterdam, NY

Remote Fellows will be considered.

Description of Fellow Project:

1. Assist the REIP Coordinating Lead Attorney and LSA’s Managing Attorney of Client Access to represent clients to secure and stabilize housing, ensure physical safety, create economic stability, and provide support for public benefits and educational needs.

This summer placement will also expose the Fellow to a broad base of legal cases managed by the Hannibal office team, including but not limited to: Landlord/Tenant/Housing disputes, Public Benefits, Medicare/Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income, Social Security Disability, Family Law, Consumer Issues, and Elder Law. The Fellow will help LSEM fulfill its motto of “Action. Justice. Hope.”

Location: Brainerd, MN & Bemidji, MN

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

This project is a partnership between Legal Services of Northwest Minnesota (LSNM) and Legal Aid Service of Northeast Minnesota (LASNEM). The project was established in the summer of 2021 with the help of two Rural Summer Legal Corp (RSLC) Fellows. Reach Justice Minnesota is a statewide network of community-based civil justice kiosks and mobile civil legal aid clinics.

In the summer of 2022, the Reach Justice Minnesota fellows will build upon the accomplishments of the 2021 RSLC fellows and expand the use of the legal kiosk network across northern Minnesota and establish regularly scheduled mobile legal clinics. One Fellow will be based out of Bemidji Minnesota and the other in Brainerd, Minnesota. Fellows will work as part of a collaborative effort and integrated into the Reach Justice team.

As background, in 2020, the COVID-19 public health emergency and economic crisis moved the justice system virtual, creating a digital divide that disproportionately impacted the communities served by rural civil legal aid programs. The use of technology to access courts, which began in March 2020 continues and is now entrenched in the operations of state district courts. To address this digital divide, the Minnesota Legal Services Coalition requested CARES Act funds to give communities access to civil justice with mobile clinics and by creating a statewide network of legal kiosks. The kiosks are stationed in a variety of court, agency, non-profit, and other community locations. In addition, Minnesota has a fleet of Justice Buses that provide mobile access to legal aid services. Together, the legal kiosks and justice buses form the Reach Justice Minnesota Project. See ReachJustice.org for more information on this project.

Fellows will drive the Justice Buses to attend outreach events and host mobile legal clinics. They will also visit community partners that host legal kiosks and provide support to this groundbreaking project.

The Fellow serving at Lone Star Legal Aid (LSLA) will implement the Homestead and Disability Property Tax Exemption project for low-income residents of rural Newton County, Texas. The Fellow will conduct community outreach and education, provide legal advice and counsel, and assist in full representation of clients who need help securing tax exemptions and/or fighting for return of their homes after unjust and improperly noticed tax foreclosure lawsuits led to home loss. The Fellow will partner on this project with Brenda Willett, LSLA Director of Litigation and well-regarded poverty law expert. Together, they will help low-income homeowners and their families preserve homeownership and home equity and gain housing stability.

Description of Fellow Project:

Since 1975, Michigan Indian Legal Services (MILS) has provided quality legal representation for the Native American communities and tribes throughout Michigan. MILS received a three-year grant, starting October 1, 2019, from the Administration for Native Americans in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to, in large part, provide 107 on-site estate planning clinics at 17 Native American community locations around the state, primarily in the reservation communities in rural Michigan. There are 12 federally recognized tribes in Michigan and several large urban Indian communities (e.g., Detroit metro, Lansing, Grand Rapids, and Flint). MILS hired a project attorney to conduct most of the on-site clinics, other MILS staff attorneys will also be involved in providing estate planning services under this grant. The Fellow in the Estate Planning project will:

- 1) Assist staff with community outreach and planning for the on-site clinics (or virtual clinic, if necessary, because of COVID-19);
- 2) Attend three clinics in rural/remote areas with the project attorney in northern Michigan or the upper peninsula of Michigan (or held virtually if necessitated by COVID-19);
- 3) Assist staff with preparation of estate planning document drafting (e.g., wills, powers of attorney, patient advocate forms)

The student will primarily work with the project attorney and a team of other staff attorneys participating in this project.

The project will be in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Housing Law Summer Fellow will support Montana Legal Services Association (MLSA)'s Housing Law Practice Group, with a particular focus on MLSA's Montana Eviction Intervention Program (MEIP). MLSA established MEIP in the Fall of 2020 using CARES funding through the MT Department of Commerce to rapidly deploy a program to boost eviction legal assistance needed by Montanans impacted by the economic fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic. The success of the program led to an extension and expansion of services, and we are now gearing up to implement a fully integrated Eviction Diversion Program in 2022 that will include a mix of legal advice, direct representation, mediation, expedited rental assistance, and housing assistance navigation.

The Housing Law Summer Fellow will conduct intake interviews and provide supervised legal advice to tenants facing eviction, and will help route clients for full representation, mediation, and other wrap-around services. The Fellow will also participate in landlord-tenant mediations and to shadow MLSA or MEIP contract attorneys in eviction cases in court.

The project will be both remote and in-person. We currently operate in a hybrid model.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Safe at Home - Child Custody Clinical Fellow will work closely with experienced attorneys and partners to set up and establish regular outreach information sessions, at least once per month, to provide information on custody rights and responsibilities. The outreach sessions will function to raise the profile of Butler County NLS services and connect more clients to custody legal services in the county. The Fellow will likewise collaborate to develop a Butler Custody Clinic to provide information and also individual assistance to clients, some of whom will be eligible for ongoing Neighborhood Legal Services Association (NLSA) representation in their custody matters.

In addition, the Fellow will utilize existing outreach presentations to create a presentation on custody law, and present information to the public at socially-distanced and/or remote sessions. Under the supervision of Managing Attorney and supported by the staff attorneys in NLSA's Butler Office, the Fellow will also provide civil legal services to clients in a Butler Custody Clinic or brief advice appointment format, offering brief advice and information on custody law. The Fellow will have the opportunity to work on custody cases, from intake to presenting motions, drafting petitions, and filing related necessary documentation to open or continue custody legal disputes. The Fellow will also assist NLS Staff Attorneys to provide targeted rural outreach and legal education for potential clients, community partners, and the public regarding legal issues related to custody topics.

These students will work to provide legal education, access to justice and investigation and defenses against rights violations of Farmworkers. When necessary, the student will support a Farmworker Rights Attorney in representation in a formal setting, such as an administrative hearing or Court hearing. In addition, the Rural Summer Legal Corps Law students will conduct legal research pertaining to labor rights issues.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Mississippi Taxpayer Assistance Project (MTAP) Fellowship is NMRLS's summer fellowship program that will be committed to helping low-income Taxpayer Clinic (LITC), Mississippi's only IRS-funded LITC.

The Mississippi Taxpayer Assistance Project (MTAP) is a Low-Income Taxpayer Clinic (LITC) dedicated to providing free tax counseling, education, legal assistance and legal representation to individuals involved in IRS disputes. The clinic is made up of one full-time employee (the director) and a part-time paralegal.

The Fellow will serve the project to:

- 1) Provide free tax representation for increased numbers of low-income taxpayers who cannot afford to pay private attorneys to address their tax problems;
- 2) Expand efforts to reach taxpayer through educational and outreach events in various Mississippi communities;
- 3) Increase the visibility and awareness of the LITC throughout the state; and
- 4) Provide the fellow with the opportunity to gain first-hand experiences in practicing law and operating a low-income clinic in rural, underserved communities

Topic of Project: Family; Housing

Location of Fellow: Towanda, PA

The project will be in-person as long as public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

Student Fellow will provide outreach, community education, and representation in a variety of cases, supervised, in Bradford, Susquehanna, Tioga and Sullivan Counties. These rural counties have significant needs in housing, debt, and consumer matters. There are also a significant percentage of the population age 60 and over, so the Fellow will also do outreach to that population to offer future care planning outreach and clinics, and consumer fraud information. The Fellow will also create networking opportunities with libraries, including the public buildings and mobile outreach, and would task the fellow with exploring regular outreach opportunities, with legal information targeted to youth and their families. This process may include some needs assessment surveys in the region.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Ohio State Legal Services Association (OSLSA) Tenant Advocacy in Appalachian Ohio Fellowship will focus on assisting with defending tenants facing eviction and gathering critical information from multiple counties, including court data and documented stories of individuals with disparate eviction outcomes because of their county location. We are seeking a driven, passionate law student who is interested in housing law and access to justice generally to join the Southeastern Ohio Legal Services (SEOLS) Housing Team's Tenant Advocacy Project (TAP) working in rural Appalachian Ohio. The Fellow will participate in TAP clinics with SEOLS staff attorneys who provide legal information, advice, and representation to low-income tenants facing eviction. The Fellow will assist staff with intakes and client interviewing, and will learn how to provide client-centered lawyering in a dynamic, fast-paced clinical setting. The Fellow can expect to work directly with tenants under the supervision of experienced housing attorneys and will observe many hearings addressing a wide variety of landlord-tenant issues.

The Fellow will also travel within our rural service area to observe how individual courts are handling evictions, particularly in cases where tenants are unrepresented. The Fellow will attend hearings in these courts, take notes and track the outcomes of cases so that the Housing Team can determine where future Tenant Advocacy Project clinics or other eviction diversion tools would be maximally beneficial. When the Fellow is not observing eviction court hearings, they will assist the Housing Team with tracking past eviction cases that have come through any of the TAP clinics. The Fellow will work closely with intake staff to collect data such as number of clients served, demographics of clients, and outcomes of accepted cases. At the end of the summer, the Fellow will report back a summary of these findings to the Housing Team. The Fellow will also shadow staff attorneys in attending relevant community outreach events and meetings with stakeholders.

Location: Oklahoma City, OK & Ada, OK

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will provide legal services through the Indian Child Welfare Act Parent Representation Project. Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) recognizes that there is a government-to-government relationship between the United States and Tribes. The law affirms the special political relationship and is not based on race or ethnic factors. Responding to reports that 25-35% of Indian children nationwide (as high as 50-75% in some states) had been removed from their families and placed at a rate of nearly 90% in non-Indian homes, Congress found that there is no resource that is more vital to the continued existence and integrity of Indian tribes than their children. The ICWA provides safeguards for Indian children and families, but most Indian parents cannot afford an attorney to help them enforce the Indian Child Welfare Act. OILS' Indian Child Welfare Act Parent Representation Project seeks to provide quality legal services to parents who are trying their best to navigate a difficult legal and emotional situation, and the Fellow will provide a variety of legal services to parents and families to help enforce ICWA.

Topic of Project: Rural & General Civil Legal Aid and Family Law

Location: Presque Isle, ME

The project will be in-person as long as public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will work within Pine Tree’s Basic Unit (housing, benefits, and consumer law) and our Family Law and Victims’ Rights Unit to provide legal services to low-income clients throughout Aroostook County. The Fellow will do a combination of substantive legal work, research projects, community outreach, and a needs assessment. Through contributions in each area, the fellow will increase the capacity of the Presque Isle office to resolve complex legal issues on behalf of more low-income clients throughout Aroostook County.

If the Fellow is not prevented by the pandemic from physically joining our local office, the Fellow will also assist with in-person research projects and outreach. The fellow will gather information on Housing Authority administrative plans, town General Assistance ordinances, and town housing codes to develop a guide for the Presque Isle office. The Fellow will engage in community outreach to increase awareness of a newly established clinic in each location and assist staff with the provision of direct legal services through the clinic. The Fellow will also work with Pine Tree staff and community members to develop and administer a legal needs assessment for Aroostook County.

This project will be conducted in-person if public health conditions allow.

Description of Fellow Project:

The Fellow will focus largely on ensuring that communities throughout the primarily rural parishes, particularly tribal communities, have access to justice. Hurricane Ida devastated large parts of SLLS' service area. All 22 parishes that we serve are included in the federal disaster declaration. To date, over 810,000 applications have filed for FEMA assistance, with almost 77,000 who live in Terrebonne and Lafourche parishes. This represents about 37% of the entire population. With significant numbers of rental units destroyed by the hurricane, many families are facing illegal evictions by landlords seeking to recoup pandemic losses. Predatory contractors are seeking to take advantage of homeowners desperate to return home to normalcy. Many of the people who have applied for FEMA assistance will need also need legal assistance with denied applications to make sure they are not left behind in the recovery process. The Fellow will provide these individuals with the legal services they require to recover after disasters and provide significant outreach.

The project will include both remote and in-person work.

Description of Fellow Project:

Southern Minnesota Regional Legal Services (SMRLS) provides legal services to low-income residents of counties from central Minnesota to the far western and southeastern borders within Minnesota. Attorneys in our Mankato and Worthington and Albert Lea offices represent rural clients in housing, benefits, consumer, and family law matters. We also provide advice on a limited basis in other substantive areas. This Fellowship will focus on meeting the challenge of the increased number of housing and eviction matters that will come forth due to the end of the Minnesota Eviction Moratorium Phaseout. There is still some protection for tenants through June of 2022, however, landlords have begun to use the options available to them to begin evicting tenants. With only two housing attorneys available to meet this increasing demand for legal services, a Rural Summer Legal Corps law student will help to directly serve clients in landlord-tenant and other housing matters.
